RAFFLE PRIZE – This months' Raffle Prize is not known at this time.

<u>COIN of the MONTH</u> – Washington Quarter (Silver –Pre 1965). (Note that this doesn't have to be a high grade coin, just a nice, no problems, coin that you, as a collector, would like to have). [The "Coin of the Month" works as follows. Bring one coin, of the type described as the featured coin of the month, preferably in a 2x2 or flip. If you bring a coin, you will get a ticket in the drawing and your coin goes into the pot. We then draw one ticket and the winner gets the entire pot of coins that were featured.

Minutes, Notes, and Happening of last months' meeting

Last month's meeting was held on July 5th. We had 19 members in attendance including our guest/newest member JimW.

President Dave F., called the meeting to order.

Dave noted that Secretary Mark, was down at Summer Seminar and not at the meeting.

Dave asked if any guests were present. We had one guest Jim W. Jim had inherited a big bag of coins from his Grandfather and had begun to look at what was in the bag and got hooked on coins. Jim ended up joining the NSCC.

Dave reminded the club members that he had old copies of various coin magazines and papers to borrow. Dave then reviewed one news story that he thought might be of interest. A 2007-D Sacagawea dollar with Presidential dollar edge lettering (rather than the plain edge that is normally on the Sacagawea dollars) was discovered by Colorado collector Andrew Moores in pocket change. He sent it in to PCGS for grading and it was graded MS-63. He also received a \$10,000 finder's fee from PCGS for letting them grade the discovery piece. It has been consigned to auction.

Dave provided reviews of the previous months' coin shows. The Colorado Springs show was very busy despite the fires that were occurring in the Springs.

Dave quickly reviewed the upcoming coin shows in the area. The only upcoming show was the Estes Park show which is a new show.

Dave reviewed the Door Prizes, Raffle, and Coin of the Month for this meeting.

Steve L. was not present so no update on the status of the Quarter and Dollars. Dave also noted that the US Mint began striking Quarters at the San Francisco mint as "Business Strikes" but they were only going to sell bags to collectors and they would not be available from the banks.

A motion was made and seconded to approve the minutes that were in the Newsletter. A motion was made and seconded to approve the Treasurers report. We currently have \$2,795.23 in the club account. (Remember that any adult member may see the complete Treasurer's report by simply requesting to view it at the meeting.)

Old Business

Nothing to report on a new meeting location.

Dave indicated that the trip to Dan Carr's Moonlight mint is still being worked out. Mark has a list of names of those who would like to go in case we get the go ahead. He would then contact the names on the list with details.

New Business

Dave brought up the issue of whether we had received payment for any new members that had joined due to the ANA offer during the Money Show. Dave W. indicated that we did receive the money for 4 new members.

Last Months' Show and Tell Recap

Terry K. - Rocky Mountain Honor Flight, a organization that is trying to take as many WWII vets back to Washington DC as possible to see the WWII memorial, which was recently completed, was having a benefit concert and they had some things for sale that included a coin. Terry bought the coin along with a patch. Terry passed around the coin and patch.

Dave F. – Dave also collects comic books. At the recent Denver Comic Con he was looking for some missing issues he needed of "Fantastic Four" and he purchased an issue #2, which was published in 1961. In the issue there was an advertisement for a \$2000 reward for an 1804 Silver dollar. It said 19,000 minted only 12 accounted for where are the rest? There really are only 8 of the original strike (Class 1) known to exist. 15 total including later restrikes. (Class 2 - 1 known, Class3 - 6 known)

He included many humorous side stories and skits.

Fun Facts on Washington Quarters.

Here are some of the facts that came out on the Washington Quarter.

- 1. None were minted in 1933 as too many were produced in 1932.
- 2. Was originally mined in 1932 as a commemorative but then they decided to continue minting them as a regular coin.
- 3. Will not find one dated 1975 due to the Bi-Centennial minting that ran for 2 years.
- 4. Design was modeled after a bust done in 1785.
- 5. 1968 was the first year the mint mark was placed on the Obverse.
- 6. Between 1965 and 1967 all coins appeared to be from the Philadelphia mint as there was no mint marks, but coins were actually produced at all the mints.
- 7. 1932 D and S are the lowest mintage dates.

Dave did actually say that 1935 and 1975 were the two dates that you couldn't find on quarters. When questioned on it the second time he said 1933. ;-)

Secretary's Editorial Page

This month I thought I would pass on some of what I learned this year at Summer Seminar.

I had the opportunity to attend Summer Seminar this year and take a course entitled "The Coinage of Charles Barber". The class was taught by Mike Hayes, a noted Barber coinage collector, and Glenn Holsonbake a coin dealer specializing in all Barber series.

Charles Barber was an engraver at the US Mint. He was the son of William Barber, who also was an engraver at the US Mint. William was promoted to the position of Chief Engraver in January 1869 upon the death of James B. Longacre. William appointed his son, Charles, as an assistant engraver in 1877. Upon his father's death on August 31, 1879, Charles was soon promoted to Chief Engraver over that of his rival George Morgan, of Morgan dollar fame. Charles remained the Chief Engraver until his death on February 18, 1917.

Charles is most known for his designs of the Liberty Nickel (1883-1912(1913)) and the Liberty Head dime, quarter, and half dollar. These last 3 were better known as Barber dimes, quarters, and halves. The Barber coins all began in 1892 and were minted through 1916 except for the half which was minted through 1915. He also designed certain commemorative coins and medals and many pattern coins that were never used. He also designed coins for other countries.

The class spent part of the first day exploring the various commemoratives and patterns that Charles designed. Many of the patterns are on display in the Bass Collection at the ANA Museum and we took a quick field trip there to view them. We also were able to examine some historical records in the ANA Library that documented what prices were charged for doing designs of foreign coins.

We did an in depth study of each of the 4 main coins described above. Following are some facts I learned about each series.

In the Liberty Nickel series the key dates are the 1885, 1886, and 1912-S. The 1885 and 1886 are tough to find in the higher mint state grades. The 1912-S, even though it had a much lower mintage is more available, as it was the last year of production and the only year to carry a mint mark, so these were saved.

The Barber dime series has only one key date if you do not count the 1894-S, which only had a mintage of 24 Proofs, and that is the 1895-O. There are also about 6 Semi-keys in the series. The 1892-S, 1895, 1901-S, 1903-S, 1904-S, and the 1913-S. There was a change in the Obverse die between 1902 and 1903 but the differences are minor.

In the Barber Quarter series, there a 3 key dates that make it very difficult to complete this collection. The 1896-S, 1901-S, and 1913-S. The 1901-S is probably the toughest. It is available in grades from G to F but still tough and expensive, but very rare in grades above F. The 1896-S is available in grades from AG to VG, but is also scarce in any grade higher. The 1913-S is found in VG to "ugly" F, it is rare in F to VF, very rare in XF to AU, but is actually available in Mint State. This is probably due to the increase in interest in coin collecting by 1913 so more coins were saved right from the mint.

The Barber Half is probably the easiest collection to complete as there are no truly rare dates. It is for this reason that this is one of the more popular Barber series to collect. Although there are no rare dates, some dates are harder to find in higher grades, or as well struck samples with many of the "O" mint coins being weakly struck. The 1904-S is probably the toughest date to find, especially in higher grades.
