Last Months' Show and Tell Recap

Bob C. - Brought in his Coin of the Year award winning Turtle Coin.

Dave F. - Talked about a new movie available on Netflix called "Coin Heist". He had watched it and said it was targeted for teenagers and wasn't really that good, but said you should at least check it out if you have Netflix.

Dave also picked up a medal at the Ft. Collins Coin Show. It was a 1876 Philadelphia Centennial Exposition Medal in the original box, which is tough to find. The medal is bronze and 3 inches in diameter.

Dave also talked, off topic, of his Fantastic 4 issue #1 comic book, in a slab from NGC's comic book grading service. It was Stan Lee's first superhero comic book.

Dave G. - talked about how France had colonized areas in North America and showed where these were on a map. He had a 1839 coin made in Paris for use in these colonies.

Mark H. - Had a 1979 Susan B. Anthony Dollar coin that he had snagged at the bank where he worked. It was in among a bunch of Presidential dollars. The reason in was in with these dollars was that it had been gold plated. In addition it was a S mint proof coin.

John D'A. - Had a Metal box from the US National Bank of Denver that had been used for storing legal papers.

Kent J. - Had an article for the Denver Post newspaper on some experimental cents made in 1942 out of glass.

The program this month was "Coin of the Year" by President Bob C. Bob talked about how Krause had started this program in 1984 and each year coins are selected in various categories. He indicated that 41 US coins have won awards and that 6 US coins have been awarded Coin of the Year honors. The 2016 Coin of the Year winner was the Copper Nickel Cupped Baseball coin. Italy and France have each won Coin of the Year 4 times and Austria has won 3 times. One of Bob's Turtle coins had won an award in one of the categories.

2. **2017** America the Beautiful Quarters Released in Proof Set, January 5, 2017 by CoinNews.net. Story Summary: The United States Mint launched its first numismatic product of the year, a set of quarter dollars in proof quality. Available for \$14.95, the annual set offers collectors their first chance to acquire all five 2017-dated quarters with unique artwork commemorating these national sites: Effigy Mounds National Monument in Iowa, Frederick Douglass National Historic Site in Washington, D.C., Ozark National Scenic Riverways in Missouri, Ellis Island (Statue of Liberty National Monument) in New Jersey, and George Rogers Clark National Historical Park in Indiana

3. **Save now for the 2019 Apollo 11 Commemorative Coins,** December 17, 2016 by Coin Collectors Blog. **Story Summary:** According to the White House News Feed, President Obama signed the Apollo 11 50th

Anniversary Commemorative Coin Act on Friday, December 16, 2016! One of the required design elements is that it be convex in shape "to more closely resemble the faceplate of the astronaut's helmet of the time" There will be a competition to determine the obverse design of the coin. The reverse design will be a representation of a close-up of the famous 'Buzz Aldrin on the Moon' photograph. There will be a \$5 gold, silver dollar, clad half-dollar and a five-ounce silver coin minted.

4. **1942** Experimental Glass U.S. Cent Goes for \$70,500 in Heritage's Florida Auction, January 6, 2017 by CoinNews.net. Made in 1942 to test as a possible alternative to copper, it is the only intact example known to exist. One other piece has surfaced but it is broken in half.

Interesting Coin Facts

In 1982 the US transitioned the cent to being made with zinc coated in copper. There were two sized dates and it has been listed in the Redbook that a total of seven varieties were available. 1982 P&D in both Large Date and Small Date copper coated zinc, 1982-P Large and Small Date copper, and 1982-D Large Date copper.

The Big news is that just recently PCGS authenticated and graded an 1982-D Small Date Copper cent as AU55.

So it looks like all eight varieties actually exist.
