Program 199

The program was on "Early Mexican Coins" by club member Dave G. The Mexican Coins were really the history of early Spanish coins that were used in the Mexico colonies. Between 1500 and 1800 85% of the gold and silver came from the "New World". Spain had 12 mints in the New World that produced gold and silver coins that could then be taken back to Spain. The first of these mints was in Mexico City in 1535. The first date on a coin was in 1607. Most of the coins were based on the 8 Reales or "Pieces of Eight". Gold coins were called Escudos where 16 Reales equaled 1 Escudo.

1. When coin collecting in the United States finally took off, October 16, 2017 (digital edition) by Q. David Bowers of Coin World. Story Summary: By the 1830s, several hundred coin collectors were active in the United States, with that number starting to grow in the 1850s, writes Q. David Bowers in "Joys of Collecting." The big boost came in 1858 when the government stopped issuing half cents and replaced the old copper large cent with a smaller copper-nickel cent. "A wave of nostalgia swept across America," Bowers writes, adding "A scramble ensued to acquire one of each date of cent minted since 1793. … By 1858, with Flying Eagle cents common in circulation and copper coins disappearing, a great passion arose for collecting cents."

3. **Brothers-in-law find ancient coin hoard 'of national significance',** September 29, 2017 by Coin World. **Story Summary:** In February 2017, two brothers-in-law discovered gold and silver buried treasure in a field north of Lincoln, the county city of Lincolnshire, England. The finders were the treasure hunting team of Sean Scargill and Hugh Jenkins. They have been detecting in and around Lincolnshire for four years. They were in an area that they had previously searched many times over the last three to four years. The final count of the excavated coins was 282, comprising 40 gold staters, 231 silver units and 11 half-units.

Raymond Reddington, played by James Spader, was trying to gain the attention of a high-rolling thief and found himself at a numismatic auction. The item up for bid was the 1943-D Bronze Lincoln cent. As part of the story, it was announced that it was the only one known to exist (there are others) and that it was graded by the Professional Coin Grading Service. Of course, they did not use a real 1943-D Bronze Lincoln cent and there was a mistake when the coin showed up later in the story. But if you have not seen this episode, I am not going to spoil it for you!

Interesting Coin Facts

Even though the recorded mintage of the 1877 Indian Head Cent is 852,500 while the 1909-S Indian Head Cent is 309,000 (almost 3 times less). The value of the 1877 is typically 3 to 3.5 times more than the 1909-S at the same grade level. It is all about survival rates, and more of the last years' production survived making them less valuable.
