## **News Items**

1. **2018 Top 10 Story - American Innovation \$1 program is underway,** January 14, 2019 issue of Coin World. **Story Summary:** In 2019 the U.S. Mint will embark on a 14-year, 56-coin program honoring American innovation, called, appropriately enough, the American Innovation \$1 Coin Program. To kick off the program, an "Introductory" coin dated 2018 was scheduled for Dec. 14 release. Release of the coins will follow the same pattern as the State Quarter Dollar Program from 1999 to 2008. Coins for D.C. and the territories will follow. For 2019, the coins to be issued will commemorate innovations from Delaware, Pennsylvania, New Jersey and Georgia.

2. **2018 Top 10 Story - Lincoln cent discoveries - Several sharp-eyed collectors find treasures in their pocket change,** January 14, 2019 issue of Coin World. **Story Summary:** A 27-year-old Texas mom discovered a 1969-S Lincoln, Doubled Die Obverse cent during her "mommy time" that subsequently graded

About Uncirculated 55 by PCGS. The first doubled die for a 2018 Lincoln Cent was reported in December. Picture shows extra thickness at the date. An unnamed 31-year-old Washington, D.C., collector found a bronze 1983 Lincoln cent transitional error while sorting through wrapped rolls of cents. Collector Amy Antone discovered a new kind of mule clash error — a 1999 Lincoln cent with a reverse showing clash marks from another Lincoln cent reverse die. Somehow, these two reverse dies clashed together twice," adding that it may be impossible to know whether the mule clash was the result of an accident or mischief at the U.S. Mint.

3. **2018 Top 10 Story - Collector surrenders a 1933 double eagle,** January 14, 2019 issue of Coin World. **Story Summary:** Mint officials reveal existence of a new example of the banned gold \$20 coin. It was turned over to the Mint through the U.S. Secret Service. Knowledge that the Mint had in its possession the surrendered gold piece came in May after a U.S. Mint legal counsel, Greg Weinman, spoke at the May 10 banquet held by the Pennsylvania Association of Numismatists. The collector believed to have been the person that turned the 1933 double eagle over to authorities never responded to Coin World's inquiries.

4. **2018 Top 10 Story - Tubman note design remains in doubt,** January 14, 2019 issue of Coin World. **Story Summary:** It may seem counterintuitive to select as one of the year's top stories in which no progress was made, a story that current government officials apparently would like everyone to forget, one whose outcome is in serious doubt. And yet, for many, the lack of any public progress on a decision made in 2016 to increase the diversity of themes and individuals depicted on Federal Reserve notes, culminating with the depiction of abolitionist Harriet Tubman on the \$20 bill, remains important today. In 2016, Obama's Treasury secretary, Jacob Lew, announced formally that Tubman would be placed on the face of the \$20 note, with Jackson to be moved to the back. The election of Donald Trump as president in 2016 placed a man into the White House who sees in Andrew Jackson (currently on the 20 dollar bill) a kindred soul. Trump voiced his admiration for Jackson and compared his own election to that of Jackson's. Treasury now says that any new \$20 note is unlikely to be introduced for another 10 years.

5. **2018 Top 10 Story - A 2018 'pink' gold coin brings new alloy to U.S.,** January 14, 2019 issue of Coin World. **Story Summary:** Breast Cancer Awareness \$5 coin made of 85% gold to help reach color required by authorizing legislation. From the issuance of the first U.S. commemorative gold coins in 1903, the composition of the gold issues of the United States was never less than 90 percent. That changed in 2018. Specifications in jewelry production for 18-karat pink gold is 75 percent gold, 20 percent copper and 5 percent silver. The composition used by the U.S. Mint is 85 percent gold, 14.8 percent copper and 0.2 percent zinc. When collectors began receiving the coins that they had ordered, some thought that the coin's hue did not resemble pink, or at least not the pink that they had anticipated.

6. Government shutdown won't stop the nation's money presses, December 28, 2018, Coin World. Story Summary: The federal government's presses should keep striking coins and printing Federal Reserve notes during the partial government shutdown that began before the long Christmas holiday weekend. That's

because the U.S. Mint, the nation's coinage producer, and the Bureau of Engraving and Printing, which prints U.S. paper money, get no appropriations from taxpayer money but instead are funded by selling the products they make.

7. **Introducing the new ABC Bullion 2019 Year of the Pig minted coin,** December 11, 2018, World Mint News Blog. **Story Summary:** ABC Bullion is proud to present its new 2019 Year of the Pig one-ounce coin in gold and silver. Those born in the Year of the Pig are believed to be easy-going, warm-hearted, focused, and honest. The pig is considered a lucky animal that is also associated with good fortune and wealth, making this coin the perfect choice as an investment or gift.

8. United States Mint Holds 2019 Apollo 11 Moon Landing Commemorative Coin First Strike Ceremony, December 19, 2018, Coin Week. Story Summary: In conjunction with the ceremony, photographs demonstrating the artwork and curved shape of the new commemoratives were shared with the media. Made in a fashion similar to the 2014 National Baseball Hall of Fame 75th Anniversary Commemorative Coin, each coin features a common concave obverse and a common convex reverse. The obverse features a footprint on the lunar soil, and the reverse features a representation of the famous photograph taken on the Moon of astronaut Buzz Aldrin facing the camera with his visor down, reflecting the lunar lander and the United States flag back to the viewer. The coin will come in a \$5 gold, a \$1 silver, and a half dollar clad coin, all in Proof and Uncirculated versions. There will also be a five-ounce silver coin in Proof. The Mint is "expecting a sell out in less than 5 minutes" when they are released January 24<sup>th</sup>.

## **Interesting Coin Facts**

The 1960 Small Date Lincoln cents are a well-known and popular variety. The Mint found that the "0" in the date of the small date variety was subject to breakage and filling with a die chip. Because of this, the mint scrapped that particular master die and created a new one with enlarged digits in the date. Because of this, the 1960 small date Lincoln cent is the scarcer of the two types.
