President's Notes

Northside Coin Club Meeting February 12th, 2019

News Items

1. **2018 Top 10 Story – The first five top 2018 stories were covered at last month's meeting. 2018 American Eagle palladium sellout**, January 21, 2019 issue of Coin World. **Story Summary:** In less than five minutes, the only American Eagle palladium coins struck in 2018 were essentially sold out. Customers ordering the Proof example were restricted to purchasing one coin per household. The Mint-determined price for each coin was \$1,387.50. They sold on eBay north of \$3,000.

2. **2018 Top 10 Story - Mint produces five World War I medals**, January 21, 2019 issue of Coin World. **Story Summary:** The Mint designed an Army medal, a Navy medal, a Coast Guard medal a Marine Corps medal, and an Air Service medal. The medals were made at 4 different mints. Mint officials made a somewhat controversial decision when it came to selling the medals. Rather than selling them individually or in a fivepiece medal set, the medals were individually paired with a Proof World War I American Veterans Centennial commemorative silver dollar. Purchase of all five medals from the Mint thus required purchase also of five identical examples of the silver dollar.

3. **2018 Top 10 Story - Landmark Anderson Collection offered top-quality paper money at auctions**, January 21, 2019 issue of Coin World. **Story Summary:** The sales of a landmark collection of United States paper money began in 2018, with numerous rarities realizing astonishing record prices. Stack's Bowers Galleries says that the total to date for the Joel R. Anderson Collection is over \$26 million. The final session is scheduled for Baltimore at the end of February 2019. The highest price was the \$2.04 million paid for the finest known Series 1890 \$1,000 "Grand Watermelon" Treasury note (Friedberg 379 a). Of the five known, only this note, graded About New 50, and one other are in private hands.

4. **2018 Top 10 Story - Coin counterfeiting remains a concern**, January 21, 2019 issue of Coin World. **Story Summary:** The collecting community expanded its anti-counterfeiting efforts in 2018, to combat the deluge of fake products, especially bullion, in the market and to spread awareness of the problem. As a result of those efforts, U.S. Mint officials began to show some awareness of the problem but still seemed to be caught off guard by its scope. A task force, with Beth Deisher, a former Coin World editor, as its director, seeks to educate "officials on the economic impact and growing threat counterfeit circulating, collectible, and bullion coins pose to the collecting community, as well as the public at large." The hobby gained a potential ally in the form of David Ryder, who became director of the Mint in April 2018.

5. **2018 Top 10 Story - U.S. Mint finally fills director's position**, January 21, 2019 issue of Coin World. **Story Summary:** The United States Mint got a director on April 12 when David Ryder was sworn in to be in charge of the agency. Ryder is the first presidentially appointed Mint director since January 2011.

President Obama nominated two persons for the position during his two terms in office, but the Senate would not confirm either appointee.

6. Planchet supply, press driving shipping delays for Apollo 11 5-ounce coin, February 1, 2019, Coin World. **Story Summary:** The Apollo 11 coins with concave obverse and convex reverse released at 10 am mountain time, did not sell out as many had expected. However, within minutes of the launch of sales the 5-ounce silver coin went into backorder status. Customers placing orders once the backorder status went into force were greeted with the message: “The expected in-stock date is Wed May 01 2019.” The primary reason for the delay in shipping the remaining coins is limitation of blank supply. Also contributing to the production and shipping delays is that the Proof Apollo 11 5-ounce silver dollar has to share production time with the 5-ounce silver bullion and Uncirculated versions of the America the Beautiful quarter dollars, which are struck on the same unique press at the Philadelphia Mint.

7. Dealer group plans nationwide ‘coin hunt’ in April Great American Coin Hunt to begin in conjunction with National Coin Week, January 25, 2019, Coin World. **Story Summary:** A program conceived as a way to draw public interest to numismatics, participating dealers will voluntarily release numismatically significant items from their own stocks into circulation. Beginning during the American Numismatic Association’s National Coin Week, April 21 to 27, the dealers will put 1 million collectible coins into circulation. Between 250 and 300 dealers have agreed to deliberately release thousands of pieces from their own U.S. inventory into circulation at restaurants, retail and convenience stores, and in higher-traffic area such as airports, train stations, malls, and town squares. In addition to common collectible coins, some dealers will be using key dates as tips at restaurants (of course mentioning to the staff that their tip is worth more than a few cents) and placing hologram stickers on some of the common coins they put into circulation. These hologram coins will include instructions for the lucky recipient to find a participating dealer and exchange the coin for a key date of the dealer’s choice worth up to \$100.

8. I attended the 2019 International Sea Turtle Symposium in Charleston, SC February 4-7. This is the third sea turtle meeting I have attended to sell turtle coins, notes, and exonumia. Most vendors sell t-shirts, hats, jewelry, or just set up a vendor’s table for publicity for their organization. There was a travel agency, The Leatherback Trust, Sea Turtle Conservancy, U.S. Navy Stewards of the Sea, St Kitts Sea Turtle Monitoring Network, Turtle Conservation Project, Sri Lanka, and Center for Biological Diversity. I sold many coins, notes, turtle silver bullion from Niue. My newest item, a Cayman Island dime cut into a 10-piece jigsaw puzzle didn’t sell as well as I had hoped.

Robert Birch engraved some of the first proposed coins for the United States. In 1792 he, perhaps with others, engraved dies used for the Half Disme and Disme. These were silver coins worth 5 cents and 10 cents. There are also a few of these known that are made of copper. He also engraved dies for a large copper cent that has become known as Birch Cents.
