Past shows were discussed. Michael attended the Texas Numismatic Association (TNA) show in Dallas. He felt it was a average show as he walked the floor as a dealer.

Michael then reviewed his “President’s Notes” news items.

A motion was made and seconded to approve the minutes that were in the Newsletter.

A motion was made and seconded to approve the Treasurers reports. We currently have \$2544.19 in the club account. (Remember that any adult member may see the complete Treasurer’s report by simply requesting to view it at the meeting.)

#### Last Months' Show and Tell Recap

Bear – Had an 1876 type set with all examples graded and slabbed. He still wants to upgrade a few of them. He wants to start working on a 1943-D type set.

#### Prize Winners

Coin of the Month: An Ike or Susan B. Anthony dollar coin. No pot this month.

Door Prize: A 1964 Kennedy Half dollar graded BU was won by Dan R.

Raffle Prize: A ANACS grading certificate for 5 free gradings, was won by Dan R.

Youth Door Prize: No prize was given out this month.

#### Program

The program in June was “Colorado Centennial Coins and Exonumia” by Dan Roussin. Dan started off by giving a little history of what was going on in 1976. In 1971 the state of Colorado introduced a bill to set up a commission to plan how to celebrate the upcoming state centennial. It would coincide with the US Bicentennial celebration. They created a medal as a fund raiser. Locals designed the Obverse and Reverse of the medal and got \$500 cash prizes if their design was selected. The Denver Mint minted the Medals. There were 100 Gold Medals produced in 90% Gold, 6% Silver, and 4% Copper. 20,200 1oz. Silver Medals were made in 90% Silver and sold for \$18.76. 46,000 Brass, selling for \$5, and 5000 Gold plated Brass, selling for \$15, were also produced. 1876 3-Coin sets were made and sold for \$40. The fund raising raised over \$3.7 Million and was considered a huge success.

# President's Notes

Northside Coin Club Meeting July 12<sup>th</sup>, 2022

## News Items

1. **Bullion Silver Eagles Struck at Multiple Mints From Beginning**, *Coin Week*, June 15, 2022. Thanks to multiple Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) requests from a California dealer and Coin World's Paul Gilkes, we now know where Silver Eagle bullion coins were struck for the entire period from 1986 to 2017. And thanks to FOIA requests filed by NGC and the expertise of their graders, who long suspected multiple mints were involved from small variations in the monster boxes and quality of the coins, they are able to identify the mint that made the coins from the serial numbers on sealed monster boxes and other factors.

2. **NGC Certifies Indian Head and Lincoln Cents with 'First Cent' Notations**, *NGC*, June 24, 2022. An amazing group of four Indian Head Cents and five Lincoln Cents dating from 1902 to 1923 have been certified by Numismatic Guaranty Company™ (NGC®) with a "First Cent" notation on each coin's label. These nine coins were submitted to NGC still in their cardstock holders signed by US Mint officers of the period attesting to the fact that the enclosed coins were the first examples of that denomination struck at the Philadelphia Mint for their respective dates.

3. **Details revealed for 2023 Morgan, Peace dollars**, *Coin World*, June 30, 2022. Uncirculated 2023 Morgan and Peace dollars will be priced at \$67 per coin. Proof versions will be priced at \$73 per coin. The U.S. Mint also plans to execute a two-coin Reverse Proof set containing 2023 Morgan and Peace dollars. That set will be offered at \$175.

4. **Unique Gold Buffalo Nickel Sells for \$400,000**, *Coin Week*, July 1, 2022. A unique gold Buffalo Nickel has been sold by Mike Byers Inc for \$400,000 USD to the JDG Trust, owner of several #1 ranked PCGS registry sets of Buffalo Nickels. Below are images and the original Mint Error News article on this unique item. As amazing as it sounds, this is a 1913 Buffalo Nickel struck on a U.S. \$5 Gold planchet. This unique discovery surfaced in 2019 and was previously unknown to the numismatic community.

5. **Adding Key Date Coins to Your Collection: First or Last?**, *Greysheet*, July 1, 2022. When many people start collecting a series of coins, they are advised to purchase the key date coins first. At our last coin club meeting, I asked people who had collected a series of United States coins when they purchased the key dates. Unfortunately, the answers did not match what the experts told us to do.

6. **'Exceptional' Roman gold coin hoard found near Norwich**, *BBC*, July 1, 2022. A hoard of Roman gold coins hidden in the decades before the Roman invasion of Britain has been discovered. Eleven coins have been found so far, scattered near Norwich in Iceni tribe territory. Their queen Boudica would later rebel against Roman rule. Numismatist Adrian Marsden said the hoard is "really quite exceptional" and more coins might be unearthed. An inquest at Norfolk Coroner's Court into the two latest finds deemed them treasure.

7. **Mint official explains weight differences for Silver Proof set**, *Coin World*, July 1, 2022. Coin World queried the U.S. Mint for an explanation of the references on silver content. U.S. Mint spokesman Mike White explains that "The silver content has not changed for any of the coins." "We made the decision last year to list all of our precious metals in troy ounces," White said. "For this conversion from grams, we used the lower specification limit of our silver blanks in order to provide the minimum amount of silver content in each coin. "So, using the dime example below, rather than use 2.537 grams (the nominal weight), we used 2.486 grams (the lower spec limit weight). Dividing by 31.103 [grams] yields 0.079 troy ounces. The same explanation can be given for the quarter and half dollar coins. The weights listed below [weights from 2021, in the reader's email] are the nominal weights and not the lower spec limits."

8. **Rare Bronze 1943 Lincoln Cent Comes to Heritage Auctions Long Beach/Summer FUN Event**, *Coin Week*, July 5, 2022. An extremely rare 1943 Lincoln cent that was struck on a bronze planchet, which has been called the most famous and sought-after error coin of all time, will be offered at auction for the first time ever when it crosses the block in Heritage Auctions' Long Beach Expo/Summer FUN US Coins Signature Auction July 14-17. The 1943 Cent Struck on a Bronze Planchet AU50 PCGS is an extreme rarity among a common mintage.
