Program

The program in August was “Continental Currency” by Michael S. Michael said that it was issued during the American Revolution and authorized May 10, 1775 by the Continental Congress. Needed funds to finance the war but couldn't levy taxes. They were issued to pay soldiers and to buy equipment and materials. They were backed by the promise to pay in the future. First issue was June 22, 1775. Was for \$2 million in Spanish Milled Dollars, made in denominations of \$1 to \$8 bills, in various denominations, and 11,800 \$20 bills. They depreciated rapidly. They tried to shame people into accepting the currency at face value. Some of the currency was printed on French Marble paper as an anti-counterfeiting device. In 1790, Congress said they would redeem the currency at a rate of \$1 in gold for every \$100 dollars in currency until September 1, 1791. They later extended the date to March 7, 1792 after which it was no longer eligible for exchange.

Michael also discussed how to collect them and showed various bills noted for their imagery and Latin wording, and how the wording applied to the colonies and the war.

News Items

1. **Why King Charles's profile may face left on British coins, and why it matters**, *NYTimes.com*, September 9, 2022. There are 29 billion British coins in circulation with Queen Elizabeth II's face on them. Since she first appeared on the coins, a year after her ascension in 1952, the Royal Mint has used five different portraits. And on all of them, she faces to the right. Now it's King Charles III's turn to be on the coins, but he'll most likely be facing the other direction. Since the reign of Charles II in the 17th century, the monarch has typically faced the opposite position of their predecessor on coins, according to the Royal Family's website. Because Queen Elizabeth faced to the right, the new king will presumably be shown facing left. There was one exception: Edward VIII, who was king for less than one year in 1936, faced to the left because that is what he preferred, even though the monarch before him, George V, also looked left. The tradition was resumed with George VI, who faced left. He served until he died in 1952.

For Great Britain and many Commonwealth nations, she was the face that graced their currency for decades, and her numismatic legacy is worth exploring in depth. She was the longest-reigning British monarch, an achievement that Great Britain honored with a special issue in 2015.

3. **The New Orleans Mint: Part Two**, *pcgs.com*, September 6, 2022. By 1850, the New Orleans Mint was producing a nearly full product line. The new gold dollars introduced in 1849 as well as the new double eagle introduced in 1850 had been added to the New Orleans Mint production roster. The products produced at the New Orleans Mint would (at one point) include all the silver and gold denominations, albeit for the 3 cent silver and \$3 gold coins produced in 1851 and 1854 respectively-just one year for each.

8. **NGC Announces ANA Grading Contest Winners!**, *NGCcoin.com*, August 26, 2022. Competition was spirited as 140 participants graded 15 coins from around the world. Thirty of 140 contestants took home prizes in the Grading Contest hosted by Numismatic Guaranty Company™ (NGC®) at the 2022 ANA World's Fair of Money in Chicago, Illinois. There were 37 more participants than in the previous NGC Grading Contest, which was held as part of the 2020 FUN Show in Orlando, Florida. Demand for the contest was high, as 140 was the maximum number of participants NGC could enroll in the competition.

10. **1927-D Double Eagle, from Bob R. Simpson Collection, sells for record \$4.44 million at Heritage U.S. Coins Auction**, *coinupdate.com*, August 23, 2022. Dallas, Texas (August 23, 2022) — An exceedingly rare 1927-D Double Eagle MS-66 PCGS, part of The Bob R. Simpson Collection, Part IX, soared to a record \$4.44 million at Heritage Auctions U.S. Coins Signature Auction. The result shattered the previous record for the 1927-D Double Eagle of \$2.16 million at Heritage's FUN U.S. Coins Signature Auction in January 2020. "We expected the strength of the \$20 Saint market to continue into the sale of Mr. Simpson's collection, but certain results still far exceeded our estimates," Heritage Auctions Executive Vice President Todd Imhof said. "What was most remarkable to me about the \$4.44 million sale was the fact Heritage delivered at least five bidders on the 1927-D \$20 who remained engaged on the coin even as it surpassed \$3 million."

11. **Group of NGC-certified Massachusetts Coins Realizes Over \$2.9 Million**, *NGCcoin.com*, August 24, 2022. Offered by Heritage Auctions, the Salmon Collection rarities were led by a Willow Tree Sixpence that sold for \$312,000. A group of 128 rare Massachusetts Colonial coins, nearly all certified by Numismatic Guaranty Company™ (NGC®), has realized over \$2.9 million in a Heritage Auctions sale. Averaging an astounding \$23,000 apiece, the coins from the collection of numismatic researcher Christopher J. Salmon were offered on August 22, 2022. The top lot was a 1652 Willow Tree Sixpence graded NGC AU 55 (lot 3250) that realized \$312,000. These silver coins from the Massachusetts Bay Colony were among the first to be minted in British America. This particular coin is also pedigreed to the Garrett Collection.
