Program

The program in February was “Terry’s Coin Shop”, skits of Numismatic situations directed by Bob B. Bob presented 3 different Coin Shop scenarios using different club members (Terry K, Mark H. and Bob C.), and a club members wife (Denise H.), as the actors. The first scenario was a collector who was very un-educated and clueless about the coins he had. The collector wanted to sell them and found out the he had overpaid for many of his coins and even had some counterfeits. He had bought them “Raw” from eBay sellers, and even some from China. He had never tried to sell any of them in 40 years, so he didn’t realize how he had been taken all those years.

The second scenario had a Widow coming in to find out what her late husband’s collection might be worth. The Coin Shop owner quickly found out that the husband had left no information about the value of his collection. There was no will or executor for the husbands collection so the wife was going to sell it. She had brought in a few examples of the coins he had. The examples included 3 1921 Morgan dollars, an 1889-CC Morgan dollar, and a 1893-S Morgan dollar. Since the Coin Shop owner had “figured out” she knew nothing about the coins or their value, he offered her \$25 dollars each. The wife thought this was a great price and agreed to sell them and indicated she would be bringing in the rest of the collection to sell to the Coin Shop owner.

The final scenario had a very knowledgeable collector coming in to sell some of his coins. These coins were all graded in TPG slabs and he had current wholesale pricing information on all the coins. He knew how much he wanted for his coins but was willing to negotiate with the Coin Shop owner to get a fair deal for both parties.

After each skit, Bob asked questions of the club members and discussed what people had learned from the skits, both good and bad.

1. Experts spot hidden image in new King Charles coins that you 'can't un-see' E-Sylum, Feb 13, 2023,

For years, coins have featured a number of hidden images, much to the delight of those who love to search for them. In good news for collectors, another surprise is on the way. The experts at Britannia Coin Company, who buy and sell collectible coins, have spotted a hidden image in the new range of King Charles III coins being released to the UK.

On first glance, it is easy to miss the hidden design. But the pros believe 'you'll never un-see' the latest detail once it has been pointed out to you. Look closely and you might be able to spot what appears to be a bird whispering into the King's ear - a move which could imply he is listening to the plight of nature. Jon White, Director of Britannia Coin Company, said: "Once you've seen the bird on King Charles's ear, you'll zero-in on it every time you see one of his coins and I suspect you'll never un-see it. "I have no idea if Martin Jennings, the artist, intended to include this hidden image. If he did, I think it's clever and fitting acknowledgement of His Majesty's passion for wildlife and that he's listening to the plights our natural world faces.

Go to eBay and do a search for King Charles coin and look at all the 50 Pence, 2 Pound Silver Britannia, 5 Pound coins, and you will see the bird in the King's ear.

2. Error Note Chronicles: Inverted Overprint Errors, PMG Notes, July 20, 2021,

US Banknotes are created in sheet form and require more than one printing. Certain elements in a banknote design, such as Treasury Seal, District Seal, Serial Number and District Number, are added to sheets of banknotes through a separate printing process and referred to as an overprint. When sheets are oriented incorrectly during the overprint printing process, the result is an Inverted Overprint Error.

This 1976 \$2 Federal Reserve Note (Richmond) is the more common type of Inverted Overprint Error, where the overprint is on the correct side of the note. As you can see, the serial numbers and seals, which are part of the third printing, appear to be printed upside-down. The back of the note appears normal.

Last week, Tebo Coin bought 10 Consecutive Serial Number 1976 \$2 Federal Reserve Notes. The middle 8 Consecutive Serial Number notes are all the Inverted Overprint Error notes.
