ANACS has a new Drop off/Pick up location

“Tebo Coin Shop” in Boulder, has now made arrangements with the ANACS coin grading company to become a Drop-off and Pick-up location for ANACS. Say you drop off some coins to be graded at the ANACS table at the Denver Coin Expo, you can have them shipped to Tebo in Boulder and pick them up there instead of paying ANACS to ship them to your address. This is also a great time saver for you NSCC members that live up north, rather than paying for return shipping or waiting to pick them up at the next coin show that ANACS attends.

SHOW US YOUR COLLECTION “Classic Commemoratives” - This is a new club activity we have started that allows club members to show off their collections. Each month we select a type of coin. Members then bring some examples of that coin, if they have them, to show off to the other members. You can bring a single coin, a few of your cool examples (high grade, errors, varieties, etc.), or even your whole collection. This is not a “Show and Tell” as you don’t have to stand up tell the whole club about it. You just

put your examples out and club members will walk around and look at each other's coins. Note that we are still doing the other "Show and Tell" activity.

COIN of the MONTH – An Eisenhower or Susan B. Anthony Dollar coin. Bring a nice, no problems coin, which you, as a collector, would like to have.

[The "Coin of the Month" works as follows. Bring a coin, of the type described as the featured coin of the month, preferably in a 2x2 or flip. If you bring a coin, you will get a ticket in the drawing and your coin goes into the pot. We then draw one ticket, and the winner gets the entire pot of coins that were featured.]

SHOW and TELL – Have an interesting item from your collection that you would like to show/talk about with the members.

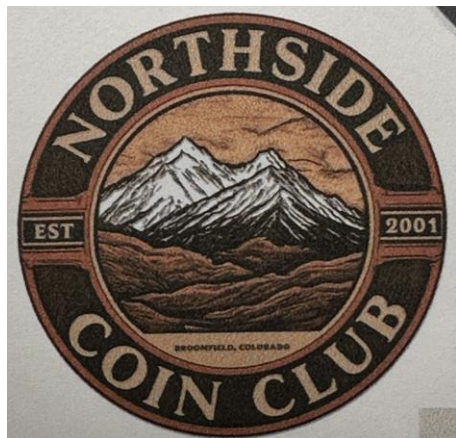
Minutes, Notes, and Happenings of previous months' meeting

The club will begin to have quarterly Auctions beginning in July. Also, auction slips for each item will need to be created by the auction item owner prior to the meeting for displaying with the auction item. Dan R. indicated the club is going to become a resource for Boy Scouts working on their Coin Collecting Merit Badge. The club will try to have scouts attend a club meeting maybe twice a year, where the members can help them by reviewing what they have done and answer questions they may have.

Program

The program in May was “Gold, Gangsters, and Embezzlement” by Tom Fesing, Chief, Public Affairs Office, United States Mint at Denver. Tom gave a quick history of Colorado and gold discoveries around the state. This was the reason that Clark/Gruber began turning gold nuggets and dust into gold coins. The US government took notice of this and purchased Clark/Gruber around 1862 turning it into an Assay Office for the United States. In 1895 funding was approved to build the Denver Mint. There was no Corner Stone installed in the original building. A 1945 addition did include a time capsule containing a 1906 Barber Half dollar, the first coin produced by the mint. Tom also told stories of various theft attempts by employees and a robbery that occurred just outside the Mint but was not a robbery of the Mint.

1. **Currency Stolen Following Central States Show, Numismatic News, May 15, 2024.** Approximately 95 percent of Emporium Coin and Currency's stock was stolen after the Central States Numismatic Society show that was held May 1-4 in Schaumburg, Ill. The Minnesota-based dealer reported over half a million dollars' worth of collector paper money stolen straight out of a car. The company reports that it is still in business. It is focusing on selling the remaining 5 percent of its inventory while working with the Des Plaines Police Department and the Numismatic Crimes Information Center to recover the stolen currency. "Things will work out one way or the other. Thanks to all my friends for all your love and concern," said Ed, owner of Emporium. He encourages anyone with any information to step forward, appealing to his regular audience with a special bulletin included in the company's advertisements. "Many of you are quite familiar with our prior ads, so if you see any items that are possibly suspect, please contact Doug Davis at the Numismatic Crimes Information Center doug@numismaticcrimes.org or the Des Plaines, Ill. Police Department (847) 391-5400."

2. **Gold set an all-time record high June 7, 2024.** The spot price of gold reached an all-time high of \$2,395.40. It's a good time to sell, people.

3. **New silver coin celebrates anniversary of Buffalo wing, Coin World, June 1, 2024.** Legend has it that the delicious and in-demand Buffalo wing was created 60 years ago by a bar owner in Buffalo, New York. To celebrate this culinary coup, Melbourne Coin Company has issued a half-ounce silver coin in the shape of the super snack. The Brilliant Uncirculated .9999 fine silver \$2 coin, issued in the name of Niue Islands, features the fiery red color of the traditional Buffalo wing, which was reportedly the creation of Teresa Bellissimo of the Anchor Bar in 1964. Bellissimo's son Dominic, and a group of his rowdy friends, arrived at the bar close to the end of business, in search of something to sate their hunger. With a little improvisation, a batch of previously unwanted chicken wings, a deep fryer, and some local hot sauce, the delightful game-day treat and bar staple was born.

4. **Morgan and Peace dollars go on sale July 11, Coin World Digital Edition, June 10, 2024.** The United States Mint will launch sales for the limited-edition Uncirculated versions of the 2024-P Morgan and 2024-D Peace dollars at noon Eastern Time July 11, with pricing at \$76 per coin. Proof versions are planned for a fall offering, date to be determined. Mint customers who registered for the option to subscribe have been able to place advance subscription orders for all five numismatic product options containing the Morgan and Peace dollar variants, to ensure receipt after the sales launches. Unlike the Morgan and Peace silver dollars from the 19th and 20th centuries, which were struck on planchets of 90% silver and 10% copper, the 21st century versions are struck on planchets of .999 fine silver.

5. COIN BOARD HOARD SALE, E-Sylum, May 26, 2024. Justin Hinh (aka Dansco Dude) wanted to give a heads-up to The E-Sylum readership about the 'Coin Board Hoard'. In late April, I flew to Green Bay, Wisconsin to help a collector sort through and prepare for the sale of the world's largest collection of coin boards. Over 1700+ vintage coin boards, folders, and albums are coming into the market. This particular hoard is a combined collection of two renowned figures in the coin board world: David Lange and Donald Kocken. The 'Coin Board Hoard' consists of 1,700 vintage coin boards, folders, and albums, many of which are among the rarest and highest-grade examples in the history of coin collecting.

In the continued fallout over two rare ancient coins sold at auction in 2020 with falsified provenances, Roma Numismatics Limited, has ceased operations. Owner Richard Beale had been arrested and later admitted buying false ownership history documents for both coins. Interesting Coin Facts

In the GSA sales of CC Morgan dollars, it was found that almost 85% of the original minting of coins dated 1885 were still in Treasury vaults. Of the 1,136,000 originally minted 1884-CC dollars, the GSA Hoard contained 962,638 of them, or 84.74%. Probably no other coin minted before 1900 has such a large survival rate.

Northside Coin Club Auction Rules

1. NSCC will hold four auctions each year in January, April, July, and October. Each auction will start at 8:30 p.m. and runs until all lots with silent bids have been sold.
2. In consideration of attendee's time, each auction shall be held in lieu of the monthly show and tell program on auction months.
3. Only members may submit lots, with a limit of up to five lots per auction. A lot may contain one or more related items including, but not limited to:
 - Coins
 - Currency
 - Exonumia, such as tokens, medals, scripts, elongates, etc.
 - Numismatic storage materials
 - Numismatic literature such as books, magazines, price guides, references, etc.
 - Collectible items of value related to the study or practice of numismatics
4. NSCC will only allow a total of fifty lots per auction. This number may change in the future. Each lot sold will be charged a commission to the club. The seller is required to pay the commission(s) for their sold lot(s) from the proceeds of their sale(s).
5. No commission will be paid by youth consignors on lots sold up to \$29.99. Youth consignors will pay commissions on any sales of \$30.00 or more according to the fee schedule. Youth consignors are any person under the age of eighteen.
6. Commission schedule, owed per lot:

No Sale = \$0
Club Donation = All proceeds to club
\$1.00 to \$14.99 = \$1.00
\$15.00 to \$29.99 = \$2.00
\$30.00 to \$74.99 = \$3.00
\$75.00 and up = \$5.00
7. Sellers must prepare and submit lot details by using the forms available on the club's website. Forms must be emailed to the Auction Secretary by the 28th of the month prior to the auction. Late submissions will not be entered into the upcoming auction but may be resubmitted for the next auction.
8. The Auction Secretary will prepare a list of auction lots and email it to current members on Tuesday the week before each auction meeting.

9. Sellers must bring a printed and prepared auction slip for each item. Auction slips are available on the club website.
10. Items accepted for auction and published in the auction list must be available for viewing by members at the beginning of the scheduled meeting, no later than fifteen minutes prior to the start of the auction.
11. The auction will start as a silent auction at the beginning of the meeting. If a bid is placed on a lot, then the lot will go to live auction at the end of the meeting. Only lots that have bids will be auctioned. Lots with no bids will be returned to their seller.
12. Any attendee, including members, guests, board members, and the auctioneer, may bid on lots.
13. A seller may not bid on their own lot.
14. A seller has the right to put a reserve price on their lot(s). Bidding will start at \$1.00 or the seller's reserve.
15. The identification of bidders and their respective bids is solely the auctioneer's responsibility. The auctioneer's decision of the winning bidder is final. In the event of a dispute, the auctioneer may restart bidding for the disputed lot at the opening bid.
16. NSCC assumes no responsibility for the identification or grading of lots consigned to the auction. All lots are sold *caveat emptor*.
17. A sale is final upon placing a winning bid.
18. Members or guests who win a lot are required to remit payment promptly following the auction and prior to the end of the meeting. Payment will not be accepted while the auction is still taking place. Sellers will receive funds after all buyers have paid.
19. All transactions must be paid with cash. Once payment is received and documented by the NSCC Treasurer, the winner may receive their lot(s) from the NSCC Auction Secretary.
