AUCTION THIS MONTH

The NSCC will be holding their first Auction in a long time, this month. See Auction rules and the list of items up for auction further down in this Newsletter. Members should also have had the Auction Lots list emailed to them in the last week. Don't forget to bring some cash so you can bid on some Auction Lots.

RAFFLE PRIZE – This month's Raffle Prize will be an ANACS Certificate for 5 free coin gradings.

PROGRAM – “Dawn of Coins” by club member Alex J.

SHOW US YOUR COLLECTION “Tokens” - This is a new club activity we have started that allows club members to show off their collections. Each month we select a type of coin. Members then bring some examples of that coin, if they have them, to show off to the other members. You can bring a single coin, a few of your cool examples (high grade, errors, varieties, etc.), or even your whole collection. This is not a “Show and Tell” as you don't have to stand up tell the whole club about it. You just put your examples out and club members will walk around and look at each other's coins. Note that we are still doing the other “Show and Tell” activity.

COIN of the MONTH – A 21st Century coin. Anything dated 2000 or newer. Bring a nice, no problems coin, which you, as a collector, would like to have.

[The “Coin of the Month” works as follows. Bring a coin, of the type described as the featured coin of the month, preferably in a 2x2 or flip. If you bring a coin, you will get a ticket in the drawing and your coin goes into the pot. We then draw one ticket, and the winner gets the entire pot of coins that were featured.]

SHOW and TELL – **No Show and Tell this month due to our Auction.** Have an interesting item from your collection that you would like to show/talk about with the members.

ANA NEWS – The World’s Fair of Money is fast approaching and will be held in Rosemont, Illinois, from August 6-10. The finest known 1794 Flowing Hair dollar, believed by many experts to be the first silver dollar struck by the young United States Mint, will be displayed for perhaps the last time for years to come. Insured for \$15 million, it is going into a private collection after the convention," said ANA Executive Director Kim Kiick.

CLUB MEMBERS PRESENTER PRIZE – The Presenter Prize for 2024 is a set of Colorado related themed Tokens. A 1969 Franklin Mint Token in Silver for Colorado in a NGC PR68 Ultra Cameo slab, from a 50 Token set representing the States of the Union. The same 1969 Franklin Mint Token in Bronze in a PR69 Ultra Cameo slab, and a Token in Bronze commemorating the Denver Mint in an NGC GEM UNC slab. Bob B. presented in January. Dan R. presented in March. Bob B. presented in April. Derek H. presented in June.

Minutes, Notes, and Happenings of previous months’ meeting

Our previous meeting was held in person on Tuesday June 11th, 2024. We had 17 members attending in person. In addition, we had two guests, Garrett C. who collects a bit of everything, and Kyle T., the grandfather of YN Garrett T. Kyle was filling in for Garrett T’s father, Andrew, who is a member and who works as Firefighter and was on duty. Garrett C. ended up joining the club. Welcome to Garrett C. The meeting was called to order by co-President Dan R. at 7:05.

Dan discussed the upcoming Summer Seminar and upcoming Coin Shows.

Bob C. went over his Numismatic News items.

Dan discussed the upcoming Auction to be held next month. He reviewed the current draft of the Auction rules. The Auction Rules were voted on by the club members and approved. The final version of the rules can be viewed further down in the Newsletter.

Dan discussed NSCC Swag. He talked about possibly getting shirts and hats that could be worn by club members to promote the club. These would be paid for by the club member who wants one of the items.

Dan would also like to see the members trying to invite people to the club to increase membership. Want to get the club up to 50 paid members. Reminded members of the flyers and business cards we can hand out.

A motion was made and seconded to approve the minutes that were in the Newsletter.

We currently have \$2188.23 in the club account. (Remember that any adult member may see the complete Treasurer’s report by simply requesting to view it at the meeting.)

Old Business

The Final draft of the Auction Rules were voted on by the club members and approved.

New Business

A new Presenter Prize was proposed to the club members. The membership approved of the prize. It is described earlier in this Newsletter in the Club Members Presenter Prize section.

Dan also talked about changing the payment schedule for the new Liability Insurance to “once a year” instead of the current “monthly”. This was approved by the membership.

Last Months' Show and Tell Recap

Dave F. – Showed off some items from a collection he is selling. He had a large square item, the size of a small plate, that was actually a coin made of copper. He also had a Swedish Dalar and a 1662 New Brunswick Thaler.

Garrett T. – Showed off his 50 State Quarters collection and his National Park Quarters collection. He also indicated he had 5 of the W mint marked Quarters.

Bob C – Had some Zombucks coins which are Zombified versions of known coins. Also had Mortuga Zombucks coins with “dead” turtles on them. 1 oz Silver and 1 oz Copper versions.

Bear S. – Had some new additions to his nudes on coins. A San Marino European Unity coin with a topless figure on it.

Justin H. – Brought in the coin sorter prototype he is working on made with Legos.

Many members brought in examples of Classic Commemoratives from their collections.

Prize Winners

Program

The program in June was “Overview of Large Size Silver Certificates 1878-1923” by club member Derek H. Derek started the program by discussing the history of the Silver Dollars and why they were discontinued in the 1870s then restarted in 1878 along with the production of Silver Certificate notes. He then moved into the history of the various Silver Certificates that were produced and did a detailed review of each denomination, how many were still thought to exist, and which ones were popular, and therefore more expensive, even if they weren't really rare. Initially only \$10 through \$1000 denominations were created. In 1886 \$1, \$2, and \$5 denominations were added. These “Horse Blanket” sized bills were continued through 1928.

News Items

1. **25th Anniversary State Quarter Program, Coin World, June 3, 2024 Issue.** This program revived interest in coin collecting across the United States in a big way. Many people collected them individually and in rolls. The article talked about how the legislation got approved and passed for the mint to start producing state quarters. It talked about the process states went through to come up with the designs for the state quarter. Every coin dealer regularly will have collections brought in to sell and most state quarter collections are bought for face value unless the coins are silver or slabbed. I don't know of any serious coin collector who brags about their state quarter coin collection. I just sold the last of my individual raw coin state quarter collection to Tebo Coin last week. Mostly. I still have a couple of Whitman folders filled with state quarters.

2. **NEW BOOK: U.S. COIN DIE VARIETIES, E-Sylum, June 16, 2024.** Volume One of a comprehensive variety identification or cherrypicking guide covering a combined total of the TOP 325+ MOST VALUABLE AND POPULAR U.S. Coin die marriages, varieties, and errors. This, the first Volume of two, covers Half Cents, Large Cents, Small Cents, Two Cents, Nickels, and Half Dimes. Volume Two covers Dimes, Quarters, Half Dollars, Dollars, and Gold coins.

While other guides may seem to cover the same ground, that is actually not the case, as the primary purpose of this guide is dedicated solely to covering a comprehensive list of coins that are actually popular in the marketplace, and most importantly – VALUABLE. You can buy each volume on the author's web page for \$100 each.

NOTE: I preordered volume 3 of The Cherry Picker's Guide from Amazon for \$39.95. It is supposed to be released on July 16, 2024.

3. **MAGNET FISHING YIELDS \$100,000 IN CASH, E-Sylum, June 9, 2024.** People who dabble in the hobby heave long ropes into the water attached to powerful magnets, some capable of staying latched to objects weighing 2,000 pounds (907 kilograms). They drag the lines through water and muck, hauling up objects that would likely go unfound by a beachcomber with a metal detector. A couple came up with a safe that they estimated contained as much as \$100,000, though the bills were partly decomposed and stuck together. The safe bore no clues to a rightful owner. The couple said they called the police to report their discovery and were told there was no evidence of a crime. They plan to take their soggy money to the Bureau of Engraving and Printing in Washington to redeem it, though he acknowledged some portion of the bills will likely be too damaged to recover.

Personally, my oldest coins are from the 1500's so I am looking forward to learning about coins from 2000+ years ago.

In honor of the 4th of July, I'd like to highlight a couple of coins from the American The Beautiful Commemorative Quarter series that stand out as particularly patriotic.



ers Coin Saratoga New York Uncirculated Reverse

The 2015 Saratoga National Historic Park (New York) quarter depicts the 1777 British Surrender at Saratoga by English General John Burgoyne to American General Horatio Gates. The Battle of Saratoga was a significant turning point in the American Revolution. This decisive victory led to the French military assistance which secured ultimate victory in the American Revolutionary War. This coin stands out in the ATB series because it is one of only a few coins that doesn't depict flora or fauna. It captures the intimate moment of the ceremonial sword surrendering. Oddly, in the actual surrender Burgoyne tried to hand over

his sword to Gates, but Gates refused to accept it, according to military custom and invited him into his tent for refreshments.



Fort McHenry Maryland Uncirculated Reverse

The 2013 Fort McHenry National Monument and Historic Shrine Quarter (Maryland) depict “bombs bursting in air” over Fort McHenry with the Star-Spangled Banner proudly waving. Francis Scott Key penned the poem that would eventually become our national anthem while aboard an English ship during the bombardment of the fort. This ATB also depicts no flora or fauna. I like how the obverse captures many key elements of The Star-Spangled Banner.

Both of these coins were minted in Philadelphia, Denver, and San Francisco in different finishes (circulation, proof, uncirculated), compositions (clad, 90% silver, and 99.9% silver), and sizes (standard quarter and oversized hockey puck 5oz). They can be found in circulation, mint sets, proof sets, uncirculated rolls, \$25

bags, and more. Prices range wildly depending on all the above but can be found for \$.25 from pocket change.

Interesting Coin Facts

In 1865 two coins were produced with both a Plain 5 numeral in the date and a Fancy 5 numeral in the date. The Indian Head Cent and the Two-Cent Piece both came with these 2 date varieties.

Northside Coin Club Auction Rules

1. NSCC will hold four auctions each year in January, April, July, and October. Each auction will start at 8:30 p.m. and runs until all lots with silent bids have been sold.
2. In consideration of attendee's time, each auction shall be held in lieu of the monthly show and tell program on auction months.
3. Only members may submit lots, with a limit of up to five lots per auction. A lot may contain one or more related items including, but not limited to:
 - Coins
 - Currency
 - Exonumia, such as tokens, medals, scripts, elongates, etc.
 - Numismatic storage materials
 - Numismatic literature such as books, magazines, price guides, references, etc.
 - Collectible items of value related to the study or practice of numismatics
4. NSCC will only allow a total of fifty lots per auction. This number may change in the future. Each lot sold will be charged a commission to the club. The seller is required to pay the commission(s) for their sold lot(s) from the proceeds of their sale(s).
5. No commission will be paid by youth consignors on lots sold up to \$29.99. Youth consignors will pay commissions on any sales of \$30.00 or more according to the fee schedule. Youth consignors are any person under the age of eighteen.
6. Commission schedule, owed per lot:

No Sale = \$0
Club Donation = All proceeds to club
\$1.00 to \$14.99 = \$1.00
\$15.00 to \$29.99 = \$2.00
\$30.00 to \$74.99 = \$3.00
\$75.00 and up = \$5.00
7. Sellers must prepare and submit lot details by using the forms available on the club's website. Forms must be emailed to the Auction Secretary by the 28th of the month prior to the auction. Late submissions will not be entered into the upcoming auction but may be resubmitted for the next auction.
8. The Auction Secretary will prepare a list of auction lots and email it to current members on Tuesday the week before each auction meeting.

9. Sellers must bring a printed and prepared auction slip for each item. Auction slips are available on the club website.
10. Items accepted for auction and published in the auction list must be available for viewing by members at the beginning of the scheduled meeting, no later than fifteen minutes prior to the start of the auction.
11. The auction will start as a silent auction at the beginning of the meeting. If a bid is placed on a lot, then the lot will go to live auction at the end of the meeting. Only lots that have bids will be auctioned. Lots with no bids will be returned to their seller.
12. Any attendee, including members, guests, board members, and the auctioneer, may bid on lots.
13. A seller may not bid on their own lot.
14. A seller has the right to put a reserve price on their lot(s). Bidding will start at \$1.00 or the seller's reserve.
15. The identification of bidders and their respective bids is solely the auctioneer's responsibility. The auctioneer's decision of the winning bidder is final. In the event of a dispute, the auctioneer may restart bidding for the disputed lot at the opening bid.
16. NSCC assumes no responsibility for the identification or grading of lots consigned to the auction. All lots are sold *caveat emptor*.
17. A sale is final upon placing a winning bid.
18. Members or guests who win a lot are required to remit payment promptly following the auction and prior to the end of the meeting. Payment will not be accepted while the auction is still taking place. Sellers will receive funds after all buyers have paid.
19. All transactions must be paid with cash. Once payment is received and documented by the NSCC Treasurer, the winner may receive their lot(s) from the NSCC Auction Secretary.
