AUCTION THIS MONTH

The NSCC will be holding another auction this month. See Auction rules and the list of items up for auction further down in this Newsletter. Members should also have had the Auction Lots list emailed to them in the last week. Don't forget to bring some cash so you can bid on some Auction Lots.

RAFFLE PRIZE – This month's Raffle Prize will be a 1 oz. Silver Round.

PROGRAM – “The Lesher Legacy on Numismatics” by co-president Dan R.

SHOW US YOUR COLLECTION “Franklin Half Dollars” - This is a new club activity we have started that allows club members to show off their collections. Each month we select a type of coin. Members then bring some examples of that coin, if they have them, to show off to the other members. You can bring a single coin, a few of your cool examples (high grade, errors, varieties, etc.), or even your whole collection. This is not a “Show and Tell” as you don't have to stand up tell the whole club about it. You just put your

examples out and club members will walk around and look at each other's coins. Note that we are still doing the other "Show and Tell" activity.

COIN of the MONTH – An Indian Head Cent. Bring a nice, no problems coin, which you, as a collector, would like to have.

[The "Coin of the Month" works as follows. Bring a coin, of the type described as the featured coin of the month, preferably in a 2x2 or flip. If you bring a coin, you will get a ticket in the drawing and your coin goes into the pot. We then draw one ticket, and the winner gets the entire pot of coins that were featured.]

SHOW and TELL – Have an interesting item from your collection that you would like to show/talk about with the members.

Minutes, Notes, and Happenings of previous months' meeting

There was a reminder of the upcoming Auction next month.

There was more discussion about having some NSCC Swag. Golf shirts, hats, etc. could be embroidered with the NSCC logo. The logo would be in Black & White. The setup fee and price per shirt would be about \$30. The club decided to postpone doing anything for six months.

Dan R. has been working with a Boy Scouts Scoutmaster to provide resources for the Coin Collecting Merit Badge. He would like to try and have scouts who are working on the badge come to the club meeting in January. Dan will be holding a Zoom meeting with them in October.

Dan would like to try to have another Coin Shop Tour in November of shops that are further south in the Denver metro area. Right now, he is thinking about Nov. 16th.

Dan also indicated that there would be a Scavenger Hunt on Saturday the 12th at the Denver Coin Expo for the kids.

Steve S. reported the results of the Denver Coin Club show held in August at the Jefferson County Fairgrounds. In Steve's view the show was a success with over 300 attendees and the club making approximately \$1500 profit. The next show, to be held in January, will have even more dealer tables available, as the show in August was sold out.

Bob C. went over his Numismatic News items.

A motion was made and seconded to approve the minutes that were in the Newsletter.

We currently have \$2084.39 in the club account. (Remember that any adult member may see the complete Treasurer's report by simply requesting to view it at the meeting.)

There was discussion of possibly having a special Sample Slab made for us by ANACS to celebrate the NSCC 25th anniversary that is coming up in 2026. It would contain a 2006 dated coin with suggestions being a Cent, or even a Quarter (with the 25-cent value representing the 25 years). The slab label would say something like "NSCC 25th Anniversary". These could be done relatively inexpensively.

Last Months' Show and Tell Recap

Dave F. – Had some Chinese items from a collection he was working with. A 1908 Tael coin. A cast Tael ingot. Some Knife and Spade money, which is commonly counterfeited. Also had some Mint trading coins from the New Zealand Mint.

Justin H. – Had a 12 ½ cent Bank note.

Garrett C. – Had a Bryan Campaign Pin. This was for William Jennings Bryan who ran for President in 1896 and 1900 on a campaign of reinstating silver-backed currency in the US economy.

Many members brought in examples of their Paper Money collections. Collections ranged from general US paper money, Foreign Paper money, and very specific US collections such as Derek H's. collection of \$5 notes.

Northside Coin Club Meeting October 8th, 2024

News Items

1. Video game maker in partnership with U.S. Mint, Coin World, September 29, 2024. Nice Gang, a new mobile gaming studio, will collaborate with the United States Mint to promote special, limited edition coins. Eighth Era, the first mobile video game title from Nice Gang, will provide players early access to unique silver bullion coins with a first-of-its-kind privy mark. Mark Salzberg, founder of Certified Collectibles Group and Numismatic Guaranty Corporation, is one of the founders of the video game company. He has a deep dedication to numismatics and has developed a game that will have appeal to younger collectors. "The extraordinary game's major characters, levels of play, and rewards are all inspired by historical coins, such as an ancient Greek Athenian Owl tetradrachm, the 1839 British £5 Una and the Lion gold coin, an Indian Head/Buffalo nickel, and an early 20th century Saint-Gaudens Double Eagle," explained Salzberg.

2. Puccini Complete Collection of Toned Morgan Dollars vivid, Coin World, September 22, 2024. un was particularly excited to find a toned 1888-O "Scarface" Morgan dollar with a prominent obverse die break. Graded MS-62 by PCGS and with a green CAC sticker, it sold for \$7,800. Price guide price was \$7,000 for this coin so not a bad deal. An electric toned 1881-S Morgan dollar graded MS-66+ by PCGS has been called "an extreme display of Mother Nature's best work" and sold for \$21,600. Price guide price was \$550 for this coin so this was a bad deal in my opinion.

3. JAMES EARL JONES (1931-2024), E-Sylum, September 15, 2024. James Earl Jones, the voice of the evil Darth Vader of Star Wars was also a coin collector who bought from West Coast dealers (and at the Long Beach shows) and helped the hobby by narrating the "Money: History In Your Hands" program. The award-winning educational video, "Money: History in Your Hands," narrated by acclaimed actor James Earl Jones, now is available for free viewing on the Professional Numismatists Guild YouTube.com channel.

4. CLEANING CURRENCY IN GAZA, E-Sylum, September 22, 2024. The prolonged closure of bank branches in Gaza and the halt in the influx of new currency since the war began have left residents using the same worn-out banknotes for nearly a year, complicating the already fragile commercial activity and sparking a rise in counterfeit currency. A new profession has emerged on the margins of this crisis—"banknote cleaning." For a fee, Gaza residents can have their worn-out currency cleaned: a 100-shekel note costs 4 shekels to clean, a 20-shekel note costs 2 shekels, and a 200-shekel note costs 5 shekels. Mahmoud Abd al-Nabi, who works in a currency exchange shop, has found a solution to preserve the life of his

customers' banknotes. "I clean old notes with water and soap, hang them to dry in the sun, and return them to customers," he said. "I wash between 10,000 and 15,000 shekels daily to restore them."

5. THAT MEDAL ON CAMPBELL'S SOUP CANS, E-Sylum, September 29, 2024. This is a medal everyone has seen but few have noticed - the one on the label of Campbell's soup cans. The medal's reverse has generally adorned the red and white Campbell's soup cans since the 1900 Paris Exposition, where the company won a bronze medal for product excellence for its condensed soup. The medal was made by the Paris Mint.

Shane Anthony Mele sent commemorative coins spiraling down a slot, to be converted from \$33,000 worth of collectibles to just enough store credit to buy a couple of 12-packs of beer. Actually, he told investigators he took some coins to a coin store in Lake Worth, where he said he got about \$4,000. He eventually grew tired of going to pawn shops and just cashed in coins for face value.

Interesting Coin Facts

The original Large Cents of 1793 were approximately the same diameter as the early quarters 26-27mm as opposed to 27.5mm yet weighed twice as much 13.48g vs 6.74g.

Northside Coin Club Auction Rules

1. NSCC will hold four auctions each year in January, April, July, and October. Each auction will start at 8:30 p.m. and runs until all lots with silent bids have been sold.
2. In consideration of attendee's time, each auction shall be held in lieu of the monthly show and tell program on auction months.
3. Only members may submit lots, with a limit of up to five lots per auction. A lot may contain one or more related items including, but not limited to:
 - Coins
 - Currency
 - Exonumia, such as tokens, medals, scripts, elongates, etc.
 - Numismatic storage materials
 - Numismatic literature such as books, magazines, price guides, references, etc.
 - Collectible items of value related to the study or practice of numismatics
4. NSCC will only allow a total of fifty lots per auction. This number may change in the future. Each lot sold will be charged a commission to the club. The seller is required to pay the commission(s) for their sold lot(s) from the proceeds of their sale(s).
5. No commission will be paid by youth consignors on lots sold up to \$29.99. Youth consignors will pay commissions on any sales of \$30.00 or more according to the fee schedule. Youth consignors are any person under the age of eighteen.
6. Commission schedule, owed per lot:

No Sale = \$0
Club Donation = All proceeds to club
\$1.00 to \$14.99 = \$1.00
\$15.00 to \$29.99 = \$2.00
\$30.00 to \$74.99 = \$3.00
\$75.00 and up = \$5.00
7. Sellers must prepare and submit lot details by using the forms available on the club's website. Forms must be emailed to the Auction Secretary by the 28th of the month prior to the auction. Late submissions will not be entered into the upcoming auction but may be resubmitted for the next auction.
8. The Auction Secretary will prepare a list of auction lots and email it to current members on Tuesday the week before each auction meeting.

9. Sellers must bring a printed and prepared auction slip for each item. Auction slips are available on the club website.
10. Items accepted for auction and published in the auction list must be available for viewing by members at the beginning of the scheduled meeting, no later than fifteen minutes prior to the start of the auction.
11. The auction will start as a silent auction at the beginning of the meeting. If a bid is placed on a lot, then the lot will go to live auction at the end of the meeting. Only lots that have bids will be auctioned. Lots with no bids will be returned to their seller.
12. Any attendee, including members, guests, board members, and the auctioneer, may bid on lots.
13. A seller may not bid on their own lot.
14. A seller has the right to put a reserve price on their lot(s). Bidding will start at \$1.00 or the seller's reserve.
15. The identification of bidders and their respective bids is solely the auctioneer's responsibility. The auctioneer's decision of the winning bidder is final. In the event of a dispute, the auctioneer may restart bidding for the disputed lot at the opening bid.
16. NSCC assumes no responsibility for the identification or grading of lots consigned to the auction. All lots are sold *caveat emptor*.
17. A sale is final upon placing a winning bid.
18. Members or guests who win a lot are required to remit payment promptly following the auction and prior to the end of the meeting. Payment will not be accepted while the auction is still taking place. Sellers will receive funds after all buyers have paid.
19. All transactions must be paid with cash. Once payment is received and documented by the NSCC Treasurer, the winner may receive their lot(s) from the NSCC Auction Secretary.
